Building Update from the Director

The Garfield County Public Library District has begun the process of building a new library facility in Rifle and an addition to the existing building in Parachute. The selection of these two projects came after a great deal of deliberation and work with the various municipalities involved. You may have heard that the District is a partner on the New Energy Communities Initiative Grant that was awarded to Garfield County and all six municipalities recently. We are planning on integrating renewable energy systems into each of our facilities and will seek additional grant funds to assist us in this effort.



The District selected Bruce Flynn of Barker Rinker Seacat as Principal Architect for the two upcoming projects. We will host public meetings in Rifle and Parachute in early January to gather community input for the two facilities. Both projects are scheduled to begin construction in 2009. In Rifle, the District determined that the best option for the library was to remain at its current location and has acquired three additional lots on the block to accommodate a 20,000 square foot library that will include meeting and study rooms, larger collections and the District's administrative offices. The library in Parachute will expand up to 7500 square feet and see an addition of a community meeting room as well as additional storage, staff and shelf space. We will be hosting community

meetings in both towns in late January.

The Town of Silt is currently working with the District at its existing location to create a joint use facility providing meeting room space in an expanded library facility for community meetings. The District is continuing to actively work with the Towns of New Castle and Carbondale on potential library sites, and a new library in Glenwood

Springs continues to be pending on land availability in the downtown core. While we don't have a firm schedule, we intend to continue to prioritize projects and bring them online as quickly as is economically feasible.

I hope this update addresses questions you may have about the building program created in 2006 when the District was formed. We want to move forward quickly on new or improved library facilities but recognize that each is a joint effort with the community it serves. We are trying to respect each municipality's concerns and plans for community development.

The Zabinskis become part of an underground effort that helps over 300 people escape the Jewish ghettos of Warsaw and certain death. The contrast between the evil in the hearts of the Nazis and the good of those who risked everything to help their fellow man will astound you. This book is a testimony to the human spirit and the will to survive. It made me much more appreciative of small everyday things.


The Big Read

The Big Read is an initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts designed to restore reading to the center of American culture.

The program provides citizens with the opportunity to read and discuss a single book within their communities. The Big Read brings together partners across the country to encourage reading for pleasure and enlightenment.

The Garfield County Public Library District is one of 189 communities participating in The Big Read from September 2008-June 2009. Community organizations are selected by a panel of experts based on each organization's experience in building strong local partnerships, reaching and engaging new and diverse audiences, working with educators, involving local and state public officials, working with media, and excellence of plans to develop and implement a community-wide reading program.

Our committee chose *The Maltese Falcon* by Dashiell Hammett. The novel features Sam Spade, an iconic hard-boiled detective.



Sam Spade is a partner in a private-eye firm who finds himself hounded by police when his partner is killed whilst tailing a man. The girl who asked him to follow the man turns out not to be who she says she is, and is involved in something to do with the 'Maltese Falcon', a gold-encrusted life-sized statue of a falcon, the only one of its kind.

The Big Read in Garfield County will take place in March of 2008. Some events in Garfield County include a black and white, semi-formal gala featuring best-selling mystery author C.J. Box on March 21st at 7 p.m. at the Hotel Colorado. The district will sponsor two contests: a short film contest for teens and adults and a weekly "falcon" hunt. The Garfield County Library District will be distributing books in January and February.

The Maltese Falcon in book, video and audio formats is now available for check out at all six Garfield County libraries.

January 15: *The History of Marble: 1884 'Til Now*

Presented by David Showalter, an award-winning videographer. It will cover the history of Marble, Colorado including the Colorado Yule marble quarry, which provided the marble for the Tomb of the Unknowns and the Lincoln Memorial.

February 19: *Immigrant Stories*

Presented by Walter Gallacher, who does interviews for the Community Integration Initiative, with the goal of gathering the recollections of immigrants and their families from Aspen to Parachute.

March 19: *Love in an Envelope.*

Author Daniel Tyler discovered correspondence from the 1870s

between Leroy Carpenter and his future wife Martha Bennett. Carpenter settled in Union Colony of Greeley, Colorado. Tyler and Betty Henshaw will read excerpts from A.R. Gurney's play, *Love Letters*, and have copies of *Love in an Envelope* available for purchase and signing.

April 16: *Martha Maxwell; Colorado Naturalist*

Mary Jane Bradbury returns to portray Colorado trail blazer, Martha Maxwell, in a Chautauqua program, sponsored in part by Colorado Humanities. Maxwell was a self-educated naturalist and artist who traveled to the Colorado Territory in 1860. She spent nearly eight continuous years in the field in the Rocky Mountains, documenting the presence of species not previously known to live there.

Jerry Barlow is a warm, accessible performer and storyteller. His unique and skillfully delivered repertoire incorporates favorite traditional pieces and his own compositions. For centuries, Celtic melodies have been played primarily on the harp, flute, pennywhistle, and fiddle.

More recently, innovative guitarists have developed methods of playing utilizing alternate tunings combined with fingerstyle techniques. In concert, Jerry brings traditional Celtic tunes alive by sharing the history, humor, and legends behind the music.

Every Child Ready to Read @ the Garfield County Libraries

“The single most significant factor influencing a child’s early educational success is an introduction to books and being read to at home prior to beginning school.”

-National Research Council, 2000



Early literacy storytimes help a child begin to read and write. Current brain research shows the earlier children learn these skills, the

more successful readers they become. Garfield County Public Libraries incorporates Every Child Ready to Read @ Your Library, a project of the American Library Association, into their storytimes through the six essential pre-reading skills. These skills include print motivation, phonological awareness, vocabulary building, narrative skills, print awareness, and letter knowledge.

- **Print Motivation** is an interest in and enjoyment of books. Children who enjoy books and stories will want to read more and will learn to read more easily.
- **Phonological Awareness** is the ability to hear word sounds, rhymes, and syllables, which is critical to successful readers.
- **Vocabulary Building** allows children to understand the world around them by knowing the names of things and increasing their reading comprehension.
- **Narrative Skills** are imperative for writing abilities and being able to describe events and stories.
- **Print Awareness** is understanding how books work and that they relay messages.
- **Letter Knowledge** is decoding and recognizing that letters and symbols hold meaning.

These pre-reading skills are the key to raising a reader. Garfield County storytimes incorporate these skills with a love of books and stories shared by your librarians.

Storytime Fun

Storytime is a wonderful way to expose small children to the joys of reading. Each week there are new stories to explore with your friendly local librarian. Storytime is also a way to develop pre-reading skills and help children become lifelong readers. All the programs are free and open to the public with no need to register.

Tell Me More is an in-depth language course that teaches speaking, reading, and writing in several languages; the Garfield County Libraries will offer

resources in English, Spanish, French, German, Italian, and Dutch.

Tell Me More uses interactive units to teach vocabulary, grammar, and culture in the language of your choice. The lessons are self-paced and are available for various skill levels. One of the most amazing aspects of Tell Me More is the speech-recognition technology that helps you hone your pronunciation. You can't get that kind of instruction from a cassette tape or a workbook!
